These counties are famous for their beautiful landscape.

The two main languages of Ireland are Irish and English. Although Irish has a two thousand year history and is still taught in schools, there is a decline in the number of people who actually speak Irish in their everyday lives. The main Irish-speaking areas are located in the west, especially on the Aran Islands. The Aran Islands are a group of three

islands situated near Galway Bay. Due to the naturally isolated nature of the islands, in the 20th century many of their inhabitants only spoke Irish. However, nowadays many of the young people leave for the mainland after finishing high school, and they speak more English than Irish because of the influence of English television.

The biggest of the three islands is called Inishmore and on its cliff tops you can find the ruins of an old fort named Dun Aengus, which is one of the oldest archeological remains in Ireland. You can get to the island by ferry and rent bicycles to tour the island or you can walk through the picturesque landscape to Dun Aengus. The view from the cliffs of Dun Aengus is very impressive and definitely worth a visit.

Much of Ireland's charm originates from its myths and legends. Ireland is overflowing with stories about fairy folk, giants, and Leprechauns. Leprechauns have become a national symbol for Ireland and usually are depicted as small, elderly, bearded men wearing green clothes and green hats. It is said that they store a pot of gold at the end of a rainbow and

if they are captured by a human they have the power to grant 3 wishes in exchange for their release. The National Leprechaun Museum in Ireland's capital Dublin provides a great introduction to the myths of Ireland. The museum tour is a lot of fun for young and old. ^-^ (Romy Beer)
