\bigstar Special New Year's and January Customs in Switzerland \bigstar

I hope everyone had a good start to the New Year! ^-^ In Switzerland we usually spend New Year's with friends, eat, go to parties, and toast each other with champagne at midnight.

However, there is a special custom in a small region named Appenzell located in the north-east of Switzerland. On the 13th and 31st of January 'Silvester Klaus' parade through the towns singing and wishing everyone good luck for the new year. "Silvester" means the New Year, and the 13th of January used to be the New Year according to the old Julian calendar.

The custom of the 'Silvester Klaus' can be traced back to the 15th century but its origin is unclear. The 'Silvester Klaus' walk around in groups, and can be separated into three categories by their costumes.

First there are the 'beautiful' ones. Their costumes are intricate and based on traditional Swiss clothing. They wear beautiful masks and hats that depict scenes from everyday village life or village festivals. Over their costumes they also wear heavy bells to ring in the New Year. The second group is called 'beautiful-ugly' and their costumes are similar to the 'beautiful' ones. They also wear hats and masks but everything is made from natural materials like moss or fir tree branches. The last category is called

'ugly'. Their costumes are made from natural materials, but are more roughly made than the ones from the 'beautiful-ugly' group, and are quite scary. Although in all groups there are female and male costumes, the bells make them so heavy that only men dress up as 'Silvester Klaus'. Regardless of the type of costumes, all the groups walk through the villages together to wish everyone good luck for the new year. There is also another custom celebrated in January by many European countries. January 6th is a Christian holiday called Epiphany which celebrates the three wise men, often called the three kings, visiting baby Jesus. In Switzerland we celebrate this day by eating a special sweet bread with raisins in it, called 'Three Kings Cake'. There is a small plastic figurine baked into the bread, and whoever gets the piece with the figurine will be king for a day. This is especially fun for children since they can wear a paper crown and have three wishes, which means they can decide the activity for the day or what they want to have for dinner. I always loved this holiday as a child, since I got to eat the 'Three Kings Cake' and be king for a day. ^-^ (Romy)
